
# Books For Africa Distribution in the Kwa-Zulu Natal Province

#### Arrival of the books:

The shipment of 40,000 books arrived at New Venture, Eshowe, Kwa-Zulu Natal on the 8 September 2009 and was unloaded into a spare storeroom. The books arrived on 20 pallets. Each box was clearly labelled with the subject on the outside. This made unpacking and organising the books very simple.



With the arrival of the books a huge demand and a lot of interest was created through word of mouth. Lungile Zikhali, a staff member of Eshowe Community Action Group (ECAG), started to contact various headmasters in the area. Amongst the headmasters she contacted was Jethro Mdlalose, a principal at Thembalesizwe Primary and a chair of the ECAG. Between these two, word of the books arriving and the future distribution spread fast and far. This immediately showed the demand and need for the books. Jethro Mdlalose, having a very good knowledge of the schools in the area, knew which schools to donate the books to and where they would be of most use.

The books where distributed on three separate days, the 10 September 2009, the 16 September 2009 and the 8 October 2009 to a total of 45 different schools in the Kwa-Zulu Natal Province. A full list of schools and the books they collected will be included in the end of the report. The reason for the delay between the  $2^{\rm nd}$  and  $3^{\rm rd}$  distribution dates was the school had taken a holiday break so we had to wait for them to return.

#### Method of distribution:

The chosen method of distribution was a simple one. The idea came from Pastor John Gaitho who undertook a similar project in Johannesburg. After contacting Pastor John Gaitho he stressed the importance of keeping the distribution as simple as possible.

On the appointed date we invited a group of headmasters and asked them to bring some students and their own transport for the books they would be collecting. The teachers and students tended to arrive over the space of an hour or so, so Mark Chennells provided grade A bags of oranges to keep everyone happy while they waited.

In the morning the teachers were given a presentation on the value of organising the books into a proper library.



The presentation outlined 4 main areas:

Why: Giving all students access, and increasing availability.

Where: Designating a static location for the books.

How: Organising the books into subject and then grade (we used a visual aid by unpacking one of the boxes and displaying them in front of the teachers), also looking at how to monitor the books.

Future: Building a good base to build and expand the library in the future.

After the presentation the teachers signed a logbook to record who was present and filled in additional details, such as contact details and age range of pupils.

The teachers picked their own subject boxes. This was a much better method than allocating the boxes to different schools, as the headmasters know what their pupils need, and so can pick accordingly. We limited the number of boxes per school, but larger schools were allowed to take a couple of extra boxes. Lungile Zikhali directed the headmasters to the boxes while Marlene Adonis, pack house supervisor at New Venture, wrote down exactly which box was taken by which school and headmaster. The full list will be included at the end of the report.



After choosing their books, the pupils and teachers loaded the boxes into their bukkies. Having the teachers bring pupils to help load made the process run much more smoothly as each teacher could pick their books and load and leave in a relatively short space of time. The whole process from the teachers arriving till the last teacher left generally took around 3 hours.

Once the books were gone it occurred to us that we had no real way of monitoring how they were going to be used. However Emmanuel Makhoba and his team, contracted by the ECAG on the building of the schools in the area, are often on site or passing schools that have received books. He has been provided with pamphlets with additional information for the teachers. He is happy to hand them out and to keep an eye on the books. This will provide a good source of feedback. All his contact details are in the back of the report.

The huge demand for the books meant the distribution process was just a simple matter of calling the right teachers, and planning. Some books were held for schools that couldn't make the appointed date.



#### Results:

After the last distribution day we went to do some visits to the schools to see how the books were being used. Four different schools were visited, two knew we were coming and we did two surprise visits.

The first school we visited was Thembalesizwe; Jethro Mdlalose was headmaster. He had a whole room dedicated to the library and the books were in fantastic condition and very well organised. There was also a full time librarian at the school, M.L Mreka.



Vulingqondo Primary was not utilising the books as well as we would have hoped. There were a number of reasons for this. Primarily it was lack of information on how to use the books, but this will be rectified when the pamphlets are distributed. Secondly they had a lack of space to store the books; again this problem will be solved by informing them of the method used by the third school visited, which method is outlined below.

The third school, Ngedlesi Primary, took a different approach with the books. Instead of having one library area, they divided the books into grades. Then the books were stored in the appropriate grades classroom. This meant there was no need for a separate room and librarian as the teacher of that grade could monitor the books easily. They also had another system in place and that was that appointed prefects within the class would control the books and look after them. This seemed like a good method of getting the children involved with the process and also encouraging responsibility in the children who were appointed prefects.




Ngedlesi Primary dedicated a corner of their classroom to the relevant books for the grade. Here is grade R (reception) books on display at the back of the classroom.

Ngedlesi Primary had not expected our visit and they had been using their books above and beyond what was expected which was fantastic to see.

Ncemaneni Combined also had a very good library system in place. They had been donated a container in which to store the books they received. This provided them with a very good and useful facility. The headmaster was also very passionate and driven. He ran after-school classes for the adults living in the area. This is a wonderful display of how the books are helping not only the children to learn but also the communities as a whole.



These site visits were generally very successful and gave a huge insight into the actual implementation of the books. To make sure that a line of communication is maintained over time there are a number of ways we can monitor the schools. Primarily Lungile Zikhali will be receiving e-mails and letters from the teachers and forwarding them on to me. Secondly Emmanuel Makhobe and his team will be distributing pamphlets with information and contact details if the teachers want any further information or have questions for us.



This is the double-sided pamphlet that Emmanuel Makhoba and team will be handing out to the schools.

Since I have returned, Melanie Brown, Lungile Zikhali and Emmanuel Makhobe have been visiting more of the schools. They visited Hhashi High School, Ntabankulu Primary and Thembalesizwe. From both these schools there was really positive feedback. Ntabankulu Primary is another example of a school allocating a free reading period during the day. This seems to stimulate and encourage the children to read outside of their syllabus.

# Improvements:

There are a few improvements I would make to the overall distribution process for the next container.

During the presentation I could have improved the visual portion of the presentation. When demonstrating a simple library, I could have displayed more books and shown how to organise them into more categories. Also, when talking about how to operate a simple signing in/out book providing an example which the headmasters could look at would have been far more beneficial.

After doing site visits, I had a much broader understanding of the varying resources of the different schools. Using this information I would tailor the presentation so that we demonstrated different systems that can be used in utilising the books. Also letting schools know of ideas already in place at some of the schools would increase their awareness of the possibilities. Some of these ideas are, for example, utilising prefects in the classes to have some responsibility in looking after the books, allowing independent reading once a week for the pupils and even potentially allowing adults to use the library books after school hours.

We delivered to a total of 45 different schools. This has given the schools a solid base of books to build on in the future. However, when choosing the schools to receive books in the future it would be better to have more structure to the selection. A few schools received more books than others, so in the future more research should be done into the facilities and number of pupils attending. The best allocation system would be to allocate books on the pupil size of the schools. However the facilities at the school must also be taken into account to maximise the implementation of the books.
